Citation:

"A novel written in the form of a memoir, it tells the story of coming into age, or gaining a consciousness amongst the ruins, human and physical, of a country. It builds on a known tradition - Chinua Achebe, who is a reference for the writer - and manages through descriptions but also through parsed dialogues, to give a voice to characterization. One gets an idea of schooling, of friendships, of humor in relationships, and of challenges facing the protagonists. The narrative tension is kept alive by a manner of writing that is guite settled. There is a clear mastery of the art of the sentence. The novel is written in a realist mode, which is certainly a necessary condition for a Sierra Leone that still has to tell its tale in a cogent manner. The novel is quite a significant contribution to African writing in this regard, and very worthy of the award."
